





### Job redundancy: check your rights and talk to Citizens Advice



One of the most serious outcomes of the current pandemic problem is that thousands of people in the UK are losing their jobs. If you are one of these people, and are made redundant or offered voluntary redundancy, it is important that you thoroughly understand your rights and options.

The first thing to do if you are at risk of redundancy is to look at your contract of employment, which will spell out your basic rights. Make sure that your company abides by these conditions. Also, consider other sources of help such as your union if you belong to one. Bear in mind that if you have been in the job for less than two years you do not have as much job protection, but if for more than two years, your employer has to follow certain procedures, e.g. find you another job in the company if possible.

You can't be made redundant in an unfair way or for discriminatory reasons. The reason must be a genuine one, i.e. the job you do or the skills you have are no longer needed, or the employer can't afford you, or the business is failing. With technology advancing, sometimes fewer people are needed to do a given job.

You might be entitled to receive redundancy pay, which increases with length of service and has two elements – statutory and contractual. Statutory pay (not paid to those who have less than two years' service) is the minimum that the law says you are entitled to, and is based on your age, weekly pay and the number of years you have worked in the job. Contractual redundancy pay is the additional amount to which your contract may entitle you. If you have been furloughed, the law says that your redundancy pay must be worked out according to your usual wages, not the 80% furlough figure. Bear in mind that if your employer offers you a suitable alternative job and you refuse to take it without good reasons, they can refuse to give you redundancy pay. You can check that your redundancy pay is fair by using the calculator at **www.gov.uk/calculate-your-redundancy-pay.** 

You are also entitled to a paid notice period or pay in lieu of notice, and the employer should give you paid time off for attending job interviews.

All the implications of redundancy are helpfully described on the Citizens Advice website at **www.citizensadvice.org. uk/work/leaving-a-job** The website also gives advice about claiming benefits or dealing with your debts if you need this. 

#### **Til Covid us do part?**





of us would have said we had a good idea of what was involved for a successful marriage or longterm relationship to succeed: more an ocean crossing than a quick speed around the bay, more of a long haul flight than a trip on Concorde... a marathon not a park run, success measured on the achievement of the long-term goal, and subject to some changeable weather, a bit of turbulence, possibly some, real sweat and tears, and the occasional need to dig deep to get through it!

And then came lockdown. There have been so many difficult, unprecedented challenges to navigate and overcome, but few that have tested marital relationships as much as month after month of enforced confinement. In fact for many couples its been not so much a challenge as an endurance event.

And whilst local infection and hospital admission rates are not rising in Wallingford and the surrounds at anything like the speed of some places in the north of the country, that could of course change at any time, and the risk of another full lockdown does seem to be very real.

The media covered widely back in the Spring the stories of Chinese couples stampeding off to the divorce courts as lockdown lifted there & predicted that we'd follow suit here. I'm pleased to say that despite the extraordinary pressures that lockdown placed on so many of us, there is no evidence of any huge surge in divorces since the harshest nationwide restrictions were lifted in July.

Indeed, there are couples who have reported huge strengthening of their relationships as long commutes and stressful working hours were replaced by lie-ins and high quality 'together' time. Some relationships have thrived in the new dynamics imposed by furlough: swapping of child care or domestic roles, others far less so. I've sadly seen some extra-marital affairs hitherto hidden away at work come to light during this time too.

The good news is that times have changed so much since I started out as a divorce lawyer nearly 30 years ago. Back then, court was pretty much the only option. Lawyers were aggressive and clients has little control. The focus was always on 'winning the case' and not on how our clients were going to live their lives afterwards.. as parents, in families albeit separated ones.

These days we have a host of options available to help repair ailing marriages, or if that isn't possible, to support couples to separate as amicably as possible, with the minimum of cost, delay and most importantly damage to their children. Highly trained lawyer-mediators meet separating couples to hep them to work out child arrangements and financial settlements. Court is always the last option now, not the first and the pandemic has finally forced the legal world to catch up with the rest of the world and go 'digital'. ## **Changing States of Mind**

Lockdown has been a mixed experience: some have enjoyed more time with their family, the opportunity to do more exercise, and for others it has been isolating and challenging. Personally I have had good days and bad days but what it has provided me with is time to reevaluate my career and learn some new skills. I have two passions Psychology and Education and have been trying to find a way to bring the two together. Lockdown provided me with the chance to figure this out and so the 'Psychology in the Classroom' Podcast was born.

My aim is to bring psychological research straight to teachers. There are many aspects of psychology that are relevant to the classroom from Special Educational needs, to the understanding of memory, to our mindset. Yet teacher training is so intense that there is little time to explore how psychological understanding can influence everyday classroom practice.

Under the current circumstances the best place to start seemed to be Mental Health and Wellbeing. I am really privileged to know Cathy Creswell, Professor of Clinical Developmental Psychology at Oxford Uni, who is a Wallingfordian as well and was willing to be my first interviewee. We discussed the impact of Covid on Mental Health and her research into this and the CoSpace study. Then Maff Potts, founder of Camerados and another Wallingfordian joined me to discuss why teachers don't need to fix but listen and be alongside those going through tough times. With the return to school there have been spikes in incidents of bullying, OCD and Eating disorders and again hearing about how to spot these and how to support young people who are struggling with these issues, directly from those who are working with the most up-to-date treatments has been a revelation. Whilst the podcast is aimed at secondary school teachers the advice and insights of my interviewees was invaluable to me as a parent as well.

If you are a teacher or a parent, please do take a listen and please do share with your schools.

### Wallingford Community Spirit Boosted by Locals' Fundraising Initiative

Wallingford Community Hospital League of Friends charity gets one of their 'biggest donations' from a young couple who raised money to make thousands of face shields for the NHS and care homes during the peak of the Covid-19 outbreak and want to give back to their local community.

In a bid to do their bit during the largest health crisis their generation has seen, Design and Technology teacher from Wallingford School Alice Walker, and local Firefighter and Carpenter John Cornelius, worked around the clock during lockdown to fundraise and make thousands of PPE face shields for key workers. They have now donated the remaining money raised to Wallingford Community Hospital League of Friends.

Alice used her skills as a D&T teacher and enlisted the help of her partner John to make the first prototype shield on 13th April: "It all started when my colleague at Wallingford School found a website that had the face shield design and all the details about how they are made and the materials needed. As the software was more my background, I decided to do what I could to make it happen. As soon as we knew this was possible with the school technology, we just knew we had to do it."

The initiative started at Wallingford School and inspired St Bartholomew's and Mary Hare Schools to join Alice and John in their amazing task of providing the community with reusable face shields. Together, they created an impressive production line and were producing them at the rate of six every nine minutes!

"Running the first prototype was the moment we realised this was possible and it was exciting to know that we could help. The main highlight for me has been getting the thank you emails and pictures from places we have delivered to. It was so heart-warming to know just how much people appreciated it."



Alice and John set up a Facebook page in mid-April to raise funds to buy materials for the face shields. In just 16 days, it raised £6,000! A chunk of it was used on materials for the face shields sent to local key workers, but then the couple decided to go further and donate the rest of the money (£3,000) to the Wallingford Community Hospital League of Friends charity.

"We wanted the left over donated money to go to back to the local community, as it mainly came from local Wallingford people, and this way we could support a great cause close to our hearts and home," said John. Paul Chisnall, Secretary for Wallingford Community Hospital League of Friends said: "They did very well and raised an awful lot of money. It's really positive they've made the contribution to us and that patients here are able to get the ongoing care. We're very thankful."

Chairman of the charity, Kate Eveleigh added: "It's been one of our bigger donations; certainly one of the biggest for a long time and we were very glad to receive it."

An impressive twelve thousand shields were cut in total and five hundred of them were dropped off at Wallingford Community Hospital during the time Alice and Johnny were cutting them over a six-week period.

Ward Manager at Wallingford Community Hospital, Andy Armsby explained: 'The face shields have all been used now. You have to change them every time you come out of the treatment room and we have to wear and change face masks regularly too so we were very glad of the generous donation and now the extra money can also go towards creating a Reminiscence Café at the hospital as well.'

Plans for the donated money are still in the discussion phase, but talks of a Tranquillity Garden being built at the Community Hospital are popular as an option for a project the money could be spent on. Paul Chisnall said: "I've got a meeting to arrange with Oxford Health about how much is needed and how much we and they can put in to it; to make it something really good for the community hospital."

Thanks poured in from NHS and care home workers who received the donations as Alice admitted it had been a team effort: "From the schools and staff for making and delivering face shields to the community for donating the money, we're thankful and just even more pleased we can provide a donation that may go towards caring for our community hospital in the future."





### Studios set to showcase best of Wallingford's creative arts

## Ayres House studios announces a two week winter 'festival of art' with outdoormarkets, an exhibition, studio tours, videos, webinars and podcasts!

An art studio in Wallingford is set to celebrate its first birthday with a winter festival of art, showcasing the best of local independent artists.

As part of the two week winter festival, Ayres House Studios, on Station Road in the town, will be holding consecutive Sunday pop-up markets on November 29 and December 6, selling artwork, crafts and gifts made by selected local makers. They will also be holding an exhibition in their Gallery space open to the public, with covid safe access to some of the studios.

"October 1st marked our first birthday and what a year it's been," said Emma Souter, Studio manager. "We had grand plans for lots of events throughout the year which have obviously been disrupted. But, I think it's really important that we do our level best to hold a covid safe festival this winter so that our artists have an outlet for their fantastic work." Despite covid, the number of artists in residence at Ayres House Studios has grown from 9 to 16, with demand for affordable creative workspaces seemingly greater than ever.

At the end of the festival, between December 8 and 12, some artists will hold small craft workshops, where members of the public can make unique crafts, Christmas gifts and decorations in the education room. For the Sunday market, Ayres Yard has gated access and will restrict the number of visitors

to maintain social distancing. (Visitors can pre book a time slot online). All visitors entering the building will be asked to sign in for track and trace, wear face masks and use hand gel. There will be a maximum number admitted at any time and a one-way system in place.

There will be a donation station on entry to Ayres Yard, with any monies raised going to help support the studios.

"So many pre-Christmas events have been cancelled due to uncertainty, so we think it's great that there is something Christmassy to look forward to as a community. We're hoping that people will support local business and independent makers and come and see the work the artists produce at Ayres House," added Emma Souter.

Works will also be on sale through the studio's website. Many of the activities will be filmed and shared on social media, alongside podcasts featuring some of the artists.

## **Recipe: Dorset Apple cake**

#### **Ingredients:**

225g Cooking apples, cored & chopped 225g Plain flour Juice of half a lemon 1.5 tsp baking powder 115g butter diced 165g soft light brown sugar 1 egg beaten 2-3tbsp milk 1/2tsp ground cinnamon



#### **Method:**

Preheat oven to 180c, grease and line a 7inch round cake tin.

Toss the apple with the lemon juice and set aside. Sift the flour & baking powder together rub in the butter until the mix resembles breadcrumbs.

Stir in 115g of the sugar, the apple & the egg, mix well adding a little of the milk at a time to make a soft doughy mix. Transfer to your tin.

In a bowl, mix the remaining sugar & cinnamon, sprinkle over the cake.

Bake for 45-50 minutes. Leave in the tin for 10 minutes to cool then transfer to a baking tray.

#### My tips:

I made the cake mixture first and then cut up my apples, so I didn't need to leave them in lemon water. I mixed my butter and flour in the food processor, quicker and just as effective than doing it by hand. I put less than half the amount of sugar in. I used a silicone loaf tin, no need to grease and line a round tin. I will try this again but may use some crème fraise or something instead of quite so much butter. I'm sure the butter helped to make it taste so good!!! It's very easy to make. It's delicious.



## **Royal Standard**

We continue our monthly dining review with a visit to Royal Standard, a pub in the centre of Wallingford. David Haines, the proprietor, took over the original pub in May 2019 and has worked hard in the past year to create a pleasant and welcoming atmosphere for many regular customers, who also enjoy the Sky and BT Sports shown on two large screens. One of the range of beers on tap is from the local Cholsey micro brewery, Amwell Springs.



There is also an added bonus of a comfortable restaurant which serves a selection of grilled steaks, burgers and pub classics such as fish and chips, chilli con carne with rice, and steak and ale pie.

We arrived at the pub to be welcomed by one of the staff asking to take our temperature, offering sanitiser and taking our contact details – all very reassuring in these difficult times.

The restaurant has a quieter atmosphere to the public bar, and was busy with several couples sitting at well spaced out tables. Looking through the menu, the first thing I noticed was the great value it offered. The Burgers, a choice of 1/2 lb beef, cajun chicken breast or portobello mushroom with salsa and haloumi, are served with a toasted brioche bun, salad, tomato, pickles, chips and texan slaw and all priced at £10. There is a selection of additional toppings for just £1 each. The Pub Classics are all £11. The steaks from the grill are from £16.95 and served with green salad, fries and peppercorn sauce. Dave explained that all his meat is supplied from Wallingford Butchers in St. Martin's Street, well known for their quality meat. Every Wednesday they have a special international dish, and the night we dined there it was Lebanese. Previous Wednesdays, it has been Mexican, Spanish, and Japanese among others.



I decided to go for a sirloin steak and my husband chose the Lebanese special, which consisted of Lamb Kofta, Falafel, Chicken shawarma (a wrap stuffed with chicken) fattoush, stuffed vine leaf, houmous and lemon rice. He really enjoyed his meal, washed down with a glass of 'Eazy Geez' and 'Rude Not to' from Amwell.



My steak was excellent, juicy and cooked perfectly to medium rare and accompanied by fresh green salad and fries with a jug of peppercorn sauce served separately on the side. The puddings are traditional classics such as sticky toffee pudding, chocolate fudge brownie, baked American cheesecake, all served with ice cream (£4.95) plus Eton Mess (which I chose and it was delicious) and a choice of ice cream and a cheeseboard.

Every Sunday a roast is served with all the trimmings (£12.95) with a dessert for just £3.00, and with child size portions available (£7.95) this is excellent value for money. In addition, every Tuesday evening there is a two for one offer, with two main meals only costing the price of one. In fact, we enjoyed our first visit to the Royal Standard so much that we returned a week later to take advantage of this offer and this time I had a beef burger topped with Stilton cheese, and once again had a great meal. For good quality food in comfortable and friendly surroundings, I can highly recommend Royal Standard.
